Carolyn Schultis seconded the motion. Baby Care Kits – Marcy Barber stated 50 kits were shipped with the Confirmation class of girls helping with the packing. Marcy also thanked the Confirmation class parents who assisted. Needs for making future kits include sleepers, socks, soap ad hand towels. Appreciation was expressed to Becky Snyder for the baby blankets she sews for the kits. School Kits – Thanks to Irene Gibson for organizing the 50 School Kits that were completed and the help received from the CrossWalk kids in assembling the kits. Eunice Circle – meeting is Monday, November 10. Coat Drive – Kendra K Weers plans to take the coats the first week in December. She will have Mrs. Becker from the school check if students can use any items and she also plans on having the CrossWalk kids inventory items donated.

An open discussion was held in regard to activity opportunities here at St. Paul – Eunice Circle Bible Study; Lutheran World Relief (LWR) projects which includes quilting, Baby Care Kits, School Kits, helping with funeral luncheons, Sunday Fellowship coffee and our monthly card project. Pastor Mark had a wonderful message about what gratitude is, that it is difficult because of all the 'cultural baggage' that comes with the word 'gratitude'. The Bible refers to gratitude as something like good fruit; how the fruit is a by-product of how the plant is cared for. Gratitude is a by-product of what YOU are doing. This is done in two parts. One is "distance, separation, space, etc.". Gratitude begins by getting some distance from work, school, house, appearance, aspirations, politics, social media, etc., etc. It's like the Sabbath where you stop working and get some distance from your week. Gratitude grows from distance of everyday life. Distance from co-dependency, being entangled in other's business, altering your state of mind. Get some distance, some gratitude that your well-being is not determined by what others think. Part two is the re-connection; reconnection to family, friends, the Thanksqiving dinner, and work. When you get some distance, it's easier to be close to people – the distance allows you to be with them in a better way, listen to them in a better way. This is gratitude; a fruit, a 'time out', a disconnection; a way to go back to others in a much healthier way by getting some distance. In the Gospel lesson of John 14, Jesus tells the Disciples that it's time to leave, to get some distance, since he is leaving them behind - being the gift instead of the possession. We are thankful for taking a break, getting some distance, then the reconnection to the gift. Happy Thanksgiving.

The second reading, also by Creyton, was about preparing our church for Advent, beginning with the paraments.
