Doubt

One of the more unfortunate aspects of current religious life is that many people seem to believe that faith is the absence of doubt. Because faith has often been identified with accepting as true a whole host of claims made by religious authorities, doubt has not been encouraged.

But think about it. What kind of relationship would you have with another that would not allow you to doubt? What kind of relationship would insist that you not question? A relationship that is offended by our doubts is not a relationship worth having. So, if the church, or other Christians etc. are offended by doubt it only reveals their insecurity and lack of trust in the God they claim to be so certain about.

In confirmation class we are currently studying about Martin Luther and the Reformation. Luther in his life was a man who as he grew older began to have many doubts about the church. Was that a bad thing? Without Luther's doubts and questions vital reform in the church would never have happened.

I would say that today, in both our religion and our politics, it is a major problem that people have "no doubts" about what they believe. It's true, doubt can be simply cynicism or lack of trust. But the doubt I'm speaking about is just the opposite. It takes courage, and faith to ask your honest questions. I "doubt" very much that God is offended by that. In fact, it just may be the entry point to a relationship that God would love to have with us and one another.

"God Sightings" were shared and Pastor Mark offered an opening prayer. The minutes from the previous meeting were reviewed. Gary moved to accept the minutes and Allen seconded. The minutes were approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Allen reported that all bills have been paid. We are behind in Mission Share, the month over month balance is going down slightly. Paid \$300 to the Diller-Odell school for STRIV sponsorship which is for the year. Issued check to WELCA from Picnic Food Stand proceeds. Gary moved to accept the report and Charlie seconded. Motion passed.

MEMORIAL TREASURER'S REPORT

Balance of Thrivent account is \$27,062.52, Memorial account balance is \$13,307.12.

Communication and Outreach – Did not meet, but helped with Confirmation Kickoff. Also did a visitor/welcome packet to first person, mentioned they could check out the YouTube church services.

CrossWalk Is Growing In Faith

The new CrossWalk year started on September 10 with more that 40 students and helpers filling the church with excitement. During the Kick Off Day, kids packed School Kits for Lutheran World Relief under the guidance of Irene Gibson and learned about the Impact Of A Pop Tab with Sheri Schultis. The day also included a September birthday celebration, songs, a review of program routines and an introduction to the Growing in Faith Tree. Everyone filled the tree with heart shaped leaves, each carrying a name. Weekly the group discusses ways we Grow in Faith and these are added to the tree.

The first day ended with ice cream and cookies sponsored by the Communications and Outreach Committee for the children and their families. The open house allowed families to connect with the CrossWalk team and gather for fellowship in the church.

The weekly lessons are focusing on the growth of the church through the work of leaders like Paul, Silas and Timothy. We are learning that God can change our lives, he is in control and that young Christians can be leaders and teachers in God's church. The learning focus for the year is the Apostle's Creed. During each opening, the group prays the Lord's Prayer and shares an abbreviated creed with actions. Students are also touching on the books of the Bible, how to use the Bible and God's Good Rules (the 12 Commandments).

As the new learning year began, the St. Paul faith family awarded a Youth Bible to the five 2nd grade students and a Beginners Bible Story book to five families who are new to CrossWalk.
