Jesus came to save us from our sins, we like to say at Christmas. In Matthew we have a hero who gives us a big part of what that salvation is. The freedom from judging by appearances. Joy to the world!

Financial Treasurer's Report

Pres Ardith Barber opened the evening unit meeting with warm welcomes. The women went right to work filling 17 College Student Care Packages with various goodies to survive finals. A handwritten personal note conveying prayers, wishes, and a scriptural based message encouraging our students to seek God's comfort in their sometimes frightening, tense journey to success in life.

The business meeting was called to order with Ardith's opening prayer and the reciting of our WELCA mission statement read in unison. Ten women, Mallory, and Pastor attended. Sec Robbyn Roelfs gave the minutes—approved as read. Treas Jeanette Bures updated us on the record of financial activity since last meeting, with a \$911.74 ending balance. Noteworthy transactions include: \$719.59 income from Diller Picnic Food Stand, \$100.00 donation from Leroy Barnts funeral, and a Freewill offering of \$202.00 for Layette diapers. Expense payment- \$216.48 to Ardith for diapers/soap.

On Sunday, November 17th, Paul Yates, Executive Director of the organization "I've Got A Name," came to St. Paul Lutheran to share his message about the organization's dedication to end sex trafficking right here in Nebraska.

Paul got his start fighting human trafficking in Nepal and continued doing that work for 12 years. In 2009, he met Bob Burton, the founder of "I've Got A Name," which came from the Jim Croce song of the same name.

Human trafficking is actually a "man's issue," a type of modern-day slavery. "Every 30 days, **AT LEAST 900** women and girls are for sale **IN THIS STATE.**" A sobering statistic shared with the congregation. "The average beginning age is 13. In Nepal, these girls go for 50¢ per night. In Nebraska, the average cost is \$210 per hour. This (sic) is power and control, **NOT** sexuality." He told the congregation about an investigator named Ron Hampton who shared the fact that one in 250 High School and Middle School girls enter the sex trade.

Mr. Yates said that despite the grim statistics, there are things that anyone can get involved and help. First thing is **prayer**. Everyone needs to **BE AWARE**. When parents ask to see their child's phone, it's not because they don't trust you...it's because they **LOVE YOU**, and what people post **STAYS** on the internet. Second thing that anyone can do is **take action**. A survivor, Megan, knew about the issue from the inside. She described how the girls were persuaded, by others telling them "I can help you make money by becoming an escort." She became an advocate for young girls on the same path she had been on by helping them to go to rehab, finding ways to return kids to their families, but mostly the rehabilitation that helped them to reclaim their lives. The third thing that we can do is **be inspired**. Anyone can raise funds to help the work they do to rescue these young girls; pray for people – **THEY CAN** turn their lives around; pay attention to the "heat map" – danger zones for being taken in Nebraska, and utilize the stay connected card. "I was sold by my aunt to a madam for \$60 and some meth at age 15," Megan said. Even after getting out of the sex trade, she had relapses, would be in abusive relationships, but always appreciated the "Memory Walk," an event to remember those who are missing. This is what finally got her out – realizing that she is a **PERSON** that deserves to be loved. We can always **pray for these women**. From Ephesians 2:10, "You are his masterpiece." Slavery is real today – **BE AWARE**. It was a positive message about a very real and present problem right in our literal back yard. A free-will donation was taken for this worthy organization.

After worship and speaker, the congregation enjoyed some fellowship time with a potluck meal. Additional resources and information like the "heat map" and "stay connected" card are available at the "I've Got A Name" website listed below. 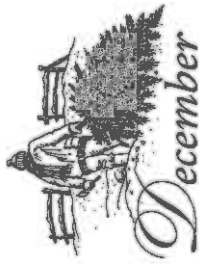

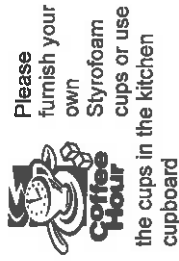
