Nobody's perfect...but we're working on it

One of the things that we say pretty easily as Christians is that "nobody is perfect". And that can be a good thing to be able to say and remember. It's a form of humility and opens us up to being together in a way that is more gracious and forgiving. It points to the freedom that we have as people to be free and holy (by that I mean at ease). It lightens the load.

However, I think it may be important in our time and place in history to add a few words to that phrase. It may be better to say these days, "nobody is perfect.....but we're working on it. The reason is that "nobody is perfect" could be a way to avoid change. It's a way to settle in without having to really look very closely at how we might improve and get better. "Nobody is perfect" could simply mean "business as usual".

But when we add "but we're working on it" something seems to change. I think what happens is that we begin to become more hopeful, and even more connected. Now I have to be clear about what my imperfections are. I have to own what it is that is my problem. And it's really good for the church as well......because it helps us get a clearer vision about what we can help each other with.

This Easter season we once again celebrate the God who loves us as we are with all our imperfections. That's the Good News. But let's not use the Good News as an excuse to get on with business as usual. Knowing how much we are cared for we can begin to take responsibility and work on the areas of our lives that need improvement. Dying to the old and rising to the new. That, after all, is the Easter story that Jesus called the Way, and the Truth, and the Life.






We lost two members of our congregation in March.

Our Deepest Sympathy goes to these families at this time of loss. May you always feel God's presence and love as you mourn.




Glenda Spilker had an aneurysm and stroke, but it was caught quickly and is recovering very well at home.






Crosswalk Reflects on the Easter Story



The Crosswalk kids spent the month learning about the Easter story. To introduce the theme they watched 'The Easter Story: The Witness'. Through the eyes of a young boy, the kids experienced Jesus' Holy Week journey from Palm Sunday through Easter morning. They got to make their own snack and colored Easter greetings for community friends while they watched.



Sixty-four Easter cards or pictures carried a greeting from the children to friends through-out the community.

The lesson of the Palm Sunday lesson was that Jesus came as a loving and humble king. Kids paraded paper palms and reflected on what being humble means.

During the resurrection lesson, students talked about the miracle of Jesus' death and return to life. Nine students told the story to the crowd by opening sacks with items relevant to Holy Week; coins, a cross, a rock, a sponge, a torn curtain, a crown of thorns, big nails, gauze to wrap Jesus' lifeless body and an empty bag. They made flower seed rings that they will plant in the dark ground to come alive again and grow.

During the final celebration kids enjoyed a special snack with items that represented the message of Easter: cheese-it crackers for the rock at Jesus' tomb, raisins for Jesus' blood, stick pretzels for the cross, M&Ms for God's goodness, little marshmallows for our sins washed away and goldfish crackers because we are to be fishers of men. Everyone enjoyed egg relays, an Easter scavenger hunt, hopping frogs because 'You Can't Keep Jesus Down', and the Miracle Cross. The day ended with a fun palm parade for parents and friends.

Paraders shouted, "Happy Easter! Jesus is Alive".
